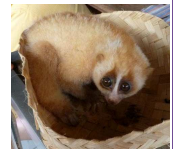



Smuggling & Illegal Trade



Smuggling Techniques

- Captured lorises are silent
- Captured lorises do not move
- Easily hidden in clothing (pockets, underpants)
- Hidden in bags, tins or boxes inside suitcases
- Openly traded in street markets; called cat, panda, koala, cuscus
- Died black, bleached yellow to increase price
- Dried or turned into paste for 'traditional medicine'

CITES

All species of slow loris are included on Appendix I of the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Fauna and Flora (CITES). No international trade is allowed.

Slender lorises are included on Appendix II of CITES. Permits are required to trade them internationally.
